Hotel Room or Dorm Bed?

Our hospitality suite is in the hotel, which is 1/4 mile from Brennan Hall. Dorm rooms are in Mulberry Hall, which is across the street from Brennan Hall in the opposite direction from the hotel. Parking is free either way.

Hotel rooms are \$89/night + tax for up to four occupants if you identify yourself as a CGO conference attendee **when you book** by June 29. Call **800-HILTONS** (800-445-8667) or 570/343-3000. Neither rooms nor prices are guaranteed after that date. Indoor pool, health club, refrigerators, voice mail, coffee makers, irons & ironing boards are available at no extra charge. If you want help finding someone to share a hotel room, contact Sue Walton (above) by May 31.

Dorm rooms are \$30 per bed per night. 36 beds have been reserved on a first-come basis. Reservations require full payment in advance. Most rooms have one twin bed per room in suites that have four to six beds and two baths per suite. Dorms have no internet or phone service, but Brennan Hall has internet service.

Those wishing to share a suite should register together. Those who register separately have no control over who their suite mates will be. Neither the Council nor its Administrators are responsible for problems between suite mates. To register for a dorm bed or to inquire about dorm registration, call Sue Walton, above.

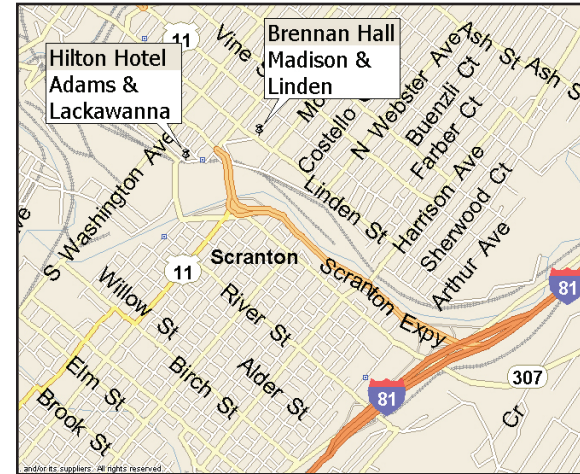

Getting There

Automobile travellers: Take the **Central Scranton Expressway (CSE)** from I-81 1 mile to the Cedar Ave. Exit; right onto Cedar; Cedar crosses Lackawanna and becomes Adams Avenue. The Hilton entrance is on the right, followed by hotel parking. Brennan Hall is about .25 mile from the Hilton, and shuttle service will be available.

From Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Int. Airport: Call for the Hotel Shuttle.

Buses: Call 570-821-3800 from the Scranton bus station for hotel shuttle service.

from New York City: Martz Trailways (800-233-8604) from Port Authority Terminal (8th & 42nd) to Scranton Martz station. .5 miles east on Lackawanna to the hotel.

Train from Newark Airport to Bus: NJ Transit trains to Penn Station; .6 miles north to the Port Authority Terminal (above).

Amtrak gives us a 10% discount. Our discount code is X29M-905. However, there is no train service to Scranton, and the most reliable bus connections are from New York City.

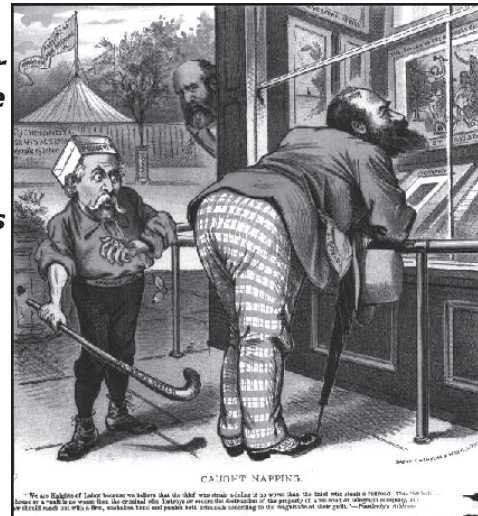
