The presentation and open discussion explores:

- ☯ Whether the *Core Principle* of the Libertarian Party is compatible with the *Ten Key Values* of the Greens.
- ☯ How both Greens and Libertarians have been lured by the old left and old right into compromising their core principles and values.
- ☯ How Greens and Libertarians could become potent forces for freedom, equality, peace, progress, prosperity and respect for the earth by returning to core principles and values.
- ☯ How preoccupation with political dominance by major parties makes them unable to stand up to power brokers on their own, and
- ☯ Why minor parties must address their differences directly instead of letting power brokers dictate compromises.

Our discussion leader, Dan Sullivan, is a former president of the School of Living, which advanced many of the Green key values of the before there were Greens. He was also the Allegheny County Chair, first of the Greens and then of the Libertarian Party. He is currently the director of Saving Communities, an organization dedicated to “bringing prosperity through freedom, equality, local autonomy and respect for the commons.”
